New for 2023

Mule Deer Conservation Area – Archery season is included on all Mule Deer Conservation Area permits, making them valid during the archery, November firearm and muzzleloader seasons.

Antlerless mule deer restriction – Antlerless mule deer harvest is prohibited statewide on all lands open to public hunting, except land in the Open Fields and Waters Program.

Nonresident permit quotas – Nonresidents will be limited to 10,000 either-sex or buck-only permits; landowner and youth permits are excluded. Nonresidents now will be limited to 15% of the total permit allocations for Calamus West, Plains, Sandhills and Upper Platte November Firearm and Frenchman MDCA permits.

Nonresident Statewide Archery – The permit quota is reduced to 3,000, and the permit no longer is valid for mule deer in the Mule Deer Conservation Area.

Nonresident Statewide Muzzleloader – The permit quota is reduced to 1,000.

Pine Ridge MDCA – This has been changed to a "draw" permit. Interested hunters should apply during the June application period. See page 6.

ANTELOPE

Nonresident Archery – This has been changed to a "draw" permit. Interested hunters should apply during the June application period. See page 6.

Harvest reporting – This will be done via Telecheck for all antelope seasons. See your permit for details.

ELK

Unit restructuring – This change helps distribute hunters and harvest appropriately across the state's expanding elk range. Unit names and boundaries all have changed. Hunters should examine the unit map and permit table carefully when planning their application. See pages 20-23 for more information.

Harvest reporting – This will be done via Telecheck for all elk seasons. See your permit and elk regulations for more details.

Centerfire rifle – Elk hunters may hunt with a centerfire rifle during the November firearm deer season.

LANDOWNER PERMITS

New Permit System – There are significant changes within the permit system that affect landowner permits. Lands and Immediate Family are associated with each Qualifying Landowner and listed only on the Qualifying Landowner's profile. Land also will be identified through Parcel Number instead of legal descriptions. See <u>OutdoorNebraska.gov</u> and search "landowner permits" for details.

Special Landowner Deer – The Special Landowner Deer permit will be available to be purchased online through the new permit system starting in 2023.

NIGHT-VISION SCOPES

It is unlawful to possess night-vision scopes while hunting game animals and game birds.

Planning Your Hunt

Big game in Nebraska primarily are managed through selective hunting harvest; species-specific permits allow a harvest that often is limited to the sex of the animal within a given location. Social and biological tolerances are the basis for permit allocations, and permits are issued through Game and Parks' public process. Take a look at the following questions and answers to help you understand Nebraska's big game permitting system and process.

What species do you want to hunt?



Nebraska has five big game species: white-tailed deer, mule deer, antelope, elk and bighorn sheep. This guide addresses seasons for those them. Turkeys have their own guide. See Turkey Guide details at <u>OutdoorNebraska.gov</u>. Search for "hunting guides."

Where do you want to hunt?

Each of Nebraska's big game species has specific permits and management units with permit quotas and specific regulations. Each species section has maps detailing management units. Nebraska is 97% privately owned and landowner permission is required to hunt on private land. For details on public lands, see our Public Access Atlas at <u>OutdoorNebraska.gov</u>.



When do you want to hunt?

Each permit has specific season dates, so please take care to follow those dates. Some seasons, like archery, are long in duration and allow a lot of opportunity to be in the field, while others can last only a few days to a week.



With which method would you like to hunt?

Each permit has specific methods (firearm, archery, muzzleloader) that are allowed to be used for the take of an animal under that permit. Some permits allow only one method, some allow all. Each method (firearm, archery, muzzleloader) has specific minimums, and those details may be found in the table on page 35.

How are big game permits distributed?

Some permits are distributed in a drawing; some are available for purchase over the counter. Some permit quotas are unlimited, but many have limited quotas to the total available. Once those limited permits sell out, no more are available for the hunting season. There also are personal limits to the numbers of permits individual hunters may have per year:

- two deer permits that allow the harvest of a buck
- one elk permit
- one antelope permit

Additional details follow in each species section.

What are the other requirements?

Hunter education, blaze orange requirements, permit carrying, method-of-take restrictions and mandatory check-in of all harvested big game animals are covered in detail in this guide.

Read this guide

With these questions in mind, use this guide to choose a permit(s) to apply for and help you prepare for your hunt.



Permit Requirements

WHAT IS REQUIRED

- Big game hunters in Nebraska must have a species-specific permit for deer, antelope, elk or bighorn sheep. Permits must be signed to be valid. A Nebraska hunt (small game) permit is **not required** for big game. **All deer, elk and antelope permits must be printed and carried on your person while hunting**.
- Big game hunters are required to have a Nebraska Habitat Stamp, except for landowners who are hunting on their own ground, residents younger than age 16 and residents who hold veteran or 69 or older senior permits.
- A hunter must be at least 10 years of age to hunt with a deer permit and 12 years of age to hunt with antelope, elk or bighorn sheep permits.
- **RESTRICTIONS:** A big game permit is valid only for the species-specific season, method, unit or area for which it is issued, and to the individual for which it is issued and may not be exchanged for another permit. **Permits are not transferable or refundable, and party hunting is not allowed.**

2023 APPLICATION PROCESS

All applications begin on the first day of each period at **1 p.m. Central time**. Permits will be available through the close of the hunting season or until the quota sells out.

ELK

Landowner Elk

May 15-June 2 – Application period for Limited Landowner elk permits and preference points. See page 21 for details.

General Elk

June 12-23 – Application period for Bull and Antlerless elk permits and bonus points. See page 21 for details.

Leftover Elk

Aug. 9-Close of seasons – Remaining elk permits are available to eligible residents and landowners. See page 21 for details.

DEER and ANTELOPE

Draw Permits:

June 12-23 – Residents and nonresidents may purchase a preference point or apply for one deer permit in the following draw units: Platte MDCA, Pine Ridge MDCA and Frenchman MDCA. Residents and eligible landowners may purchase a preference point or apply for one October Firearm or Muzzleloader antelope permit. Nonresidents may apply for one Archery Antelope permit. Results of the draw will be available by the first Friday in July. Successful applicants will have until July 15 to complete the purchase of their awarded permits. Awarded but unpaid permits will result in the applicant losing preference points and forfeiting the permit. Forfeited permits may be made available to the next unsuccessful applicant, any remaining permits will go to the leftover sales dates in August.

Unlimited Quota Deer and Antelope:

July 10-Close of seasons – Residents, nonresidents and eligible landowners may buy any unlimited quota deer and antelope permits.

Resident Limited Quota Deer:

July 11-Close of seasons – Residents may buy any limited quota deer permits.

Resident Limited Quota Antelope: July 12-Close of seasons – Residents may buy any limited quota antelope permits. Nonresident Limited Quota Deer:

July 24-Close of seasons – Nonresidents may buy any limited quota deer permits.

Nonresident Limited Quota Antelope:

July 25-Close of seasons – Nonresidents may buy any limited quota antelope permits.

Leftover Deer:

Aug. 7-Close of seasons - Residents and nonresidents may buy any remaining draw deer permits.

Leftover Antelope:

Aug. 8-Close of seasons – Residents, nonresidents and eligible landowners may buy any remaining draw antelope permits.

You may apply via any of the following:

- Online: Visit goOutdoorsNE.com during the applicable periods.
- Via mail: Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, 2200 N. 33rd St., Lincoln, NE, 68503.
- In person: Visit a Commission permitting office. (For landowner elk applications, see page 21)

You must provide:

- A 2023 Big Game Application (available in this guide, at permitting offices or online).
- Full name, birth date, address and physical description.
- Last four digits of Social Security number (Non-U.S. citizens are exempt. Call 402-471-5455.)
- Hunter or bow hunter education number, if required.
- Payment: Credit or debit cards (VISA, Discover and MasterCard only), cash, checks or money orders.
- Email address (used to notify successful applicants of permit drawings).

Residency:

The requirements to qualify as a Nebraska resident to buy a hunting permit:

- Reside in Nebraska continuously for at least 30 days before making application for a permit and intend to become a Nebraska resident.
- Residents in school in another state or stationed outside Nebraska as part of a military assignment who have maintained Nebraska as their state of legal residency.
- Active-duty military personnel and full-time students stationed or attending school in Nebraska for a period of at least 30 days.

NOTE: A new resident should be prepared to provide documentation of residency (driver's license, voter registration, etc.) to an officer when in possession of a permit.

Buddy Applications:

Nebraska allows hunters to apply as "buddies" to ensure that both or neither of their party will draw a permit in the same unit. "Buddy" applications are treated as one application in the drawing. The preference and bonus point level used will be determined by the lowest point total of the party (e.g. Applicant A has 3 points and Applicant B has 4 points, the application will be credited with 3 points). Buddy applications are limited to two applicants. Both applicants must have the same residency status. If applying by mail, both applications must be marked as "buddy" and submitted in the same envelope. If applying online, applicants must select the "group" application. Changes to your buddy status or your unit choice may be made before the end of the application period by logging into your account at <u>goOutdoorsNE.com</u>. See <u>OutdoorNebraska</u>.

PURCHASING POINTS

Applicants may purchase a preference or bonus point in lieu of participating in the drawings for antelope, deer or elk permits. Purchasing a point takes the place of participating in the draw. (See table on right.)

LANDOWNER PERMITS

Limited landowner and special landowner deer permits are available to qualifying landowners and their immediate family. An individual may qualify as a landowner by 1) owning the minimum amount of agricultural land, 2) leasing the minimum amount of agricultural land or 3) being a partner, officer, shareholder, or beneficiary designated as the qualifying landowner by a partnership, corporation or trust that owns the minimum amount of agricultural land. One third of limited elk and antelope permits are allocated to the limited landowner quota. All qualifying acres must be owned or leased for agricultural production. Hunting leases do not qualify. Landowners may only have one limited landowner permit per species per year and one special landowner deer permit per year.

The definition of immediate family is: spouse, child, stepchild, spouse of child or stepchild, grandchild, step grandchild, spouse of grandchild or step grandchild, sibling sharing ownership or spouse of sibling.

Minimum qualifications:

- Deer and Antelope: RESIDENTS who own or lease 80 acres and NONRESIDENTS who own 320 acres.
- Elk: RESIDENTS who own 320 acres or lease 640 acres and NONRESIDENTS who own 1,280 acres.

For limited landowner permits and special landowner deer permits, the maximum number of permits or applications allowed for one farm or ranch is the total number of acres divided by the minimum. For example, a 240-acre farm could have a maximum of three resident landowner permits issued.

No more than two special landowner deer permits will be issued to persons age 19 and older and six permits to persons younger than 19, per qualifying landowner.

Landowner permit details and the application process for each species are in their respective species section. See <u>OutdoorNebraska.gov</u> and search for landowner-permits for details.

MULTISPECIES LOTTERY PERMITS *

Super Tag – Permit valid in 2023 and 2024 for one elk of either sex, one antelope of either sex, one deer of either sex, and two turkeys (only toms and bearded hens may be taken in the spring). The permit is valid in open seasons with the appropriate weapons.

 Number of Permits Authorized – One permit is authorized for residents only, and one permit is authorized for residents/nonresidents. Persons may apply for the residents-only permit once per year. Persons may apply for the resident/nonresident permit multiple times per year. Winners require a Habitat Stamp.

Combo – Permit valid in 2023 and 2024 for one antelope of either sex, one deer of either sex, and two turkeys (only toms and bearded hens may be taken in the spring). The permit is valid in open seasons with the appropriate weapons.

• Number of Permits Authorized – One permit is authorized for residents only, and one permit is authorized for nonresidents only. Qualifying persons may apply multiple times per year. Winners require a Habitat Stamp.

Application Period – Jan. 2 - first Friday in July (July 7), 2023. Applications must be received by Game and Parks by 5 p.m. (11:59 p.m. if applying online) on July 7.

Drawing – The drawing will be held following the close of the application period. Winners will be notified.

* awarded permits do not count against permit limits for each species

HUNTER EDUCATION

- 1 Hunters ages 12 through 29 must carry proof of successful completion of firearm hunter education while hunting with a firearm or air gun.
- 2 Hunters ages 12 through 29 must carry proof of successful completion of bow hunter education while hunting deer, antelope, elk, or bighorn sheep with bow and arrow or crossbow.
- *3* Hunters ages 12 through 29 who have not completed firearm and/or bow hunter education may obtain an Apprentice Hunter Education Exemption Certificate.

ACCOMPANIMENT

- 4 Firearm hunters ages 11 or younger must be accompanied by a licensed person age 19 or older.
- 5 Any deer, elk, antelope, or bighorn sheep hunters ages 15 or younger must be accompanied by a licensed person age 19 and older.
- 6 Hunters holding an Apprentice Hunter Education Exemption Certificate must be accompanied by a licensed person age 19 or older. The accompanying person, if age 19-29, must be certified in hunter education.

DEFINITIONS

Accompanied – In the presence of a licensed hunter age 19 or older. The accompanying hunter may not accompany more than two hunters at a time using the Apprentice Hunter Education Exemption Certificate. The accompanying adult hunter must at all times be in unaided visual and verbal communication with the novice hunter.

Licensed – Has a valid Nebraska hunting permit.

Apprentice Hunter Education Certificate – Persons who have not completed a firearm hunter and/or bow hunter education course may obtain an Apprentice Hunter Education Exemption Certificate from Game and Parks. This provides the novice hunter age 12 and older a chance to hunt and receive training before completing hunter education. The certificate may be obtained once in a lifetime, expires on Dec. 31 and may be renewed once, in the following year only. The fee is \$5.

Deer

2023 FORECAST

2022 saw significant declines in whitetail and mule deer harvests. Statewide, mule deer buck harvest in 2022 was the lowest since 1981. There have been significant reductions in permit quotas and bag limits across much of the state. Read the permit details so you are aware of these changes ahead of your hunting season.

SEASON DATES

- Archery: Sept. 1 Dec. 31, 2023
- Special Landowner: Nov. 4 6, 2023
- November Firearm: Nov. 11 19, 2023
- Muzzleloader: Dec. 1 31, 2023
- October River Antlerless Firearm: Oct. 1 15, 2023
- River Antlerless Late Firearm: Jan. 1 31, 2024 (River Antlerless permit only)
- Antlerless Only Season Choice: Sept. 1, 2023 Jan. 15, 2024
- Late Antlerless Only Firearm: Jan. 1 15, 2024 (Antlerless Only, Youth and Landowner permits, antlerless harvest only)

WHEN IS THE FIREARM SEASON?

Commission Order CO3.05 states that the Deer Firearm season is "nine (9) consecutive days beginning the Saturday closest to November 13."





- Buck A deer having at least one antler 6 inches or more in length.
- Antierless A deer with no antiers or antiers less than 6 inches in length.

PERMIT MAXIMUMS

Individuals may only have **two permits that allow the harvest of a buck** per year. Beyond unit quotas, there is no individual limit to the number of antlerless permits.

"SEASON CHOICE" EXPLAINED

Many permits utilize a "season choice" format. These permits are valid for the entire season and the method of take is open to the legal method of the current open season, which includes Archery, November Firearm, Muzzleloader and may include Late Firearm Antlerless. Landowner, Youth, Statewide Whitetail Buck, Antlerless Only and River Antlerless permits all follow this format of allowing hunters their choice of weapon based on the open season. The Special Landowner Season is **not** considered an "open" season for permits of this format. Follow the season dates on the permit.

PERMIT DRAWING

- Frenchman MDCA, Pine Ridge MDCA and Platte MDCA permits are DRAW units and available during the application period.
- The deer drawing is a preference point-based system, and those applicants who were unsuccessful are given a preference point toward future drawings.
- In lieu of participating in the draw, hunters may purchase one deer preference point per year during the application period.
- Permits are awarded to applicants with the highest number of points first until the permit quota is filled.
- All points are lost once a permit is awarded during the drawing, whether first or second choice.
- Draw results from previous years can be found at <u>OutdoorNebraska.gov</u>.
- Any forfeited permits may be made available to the next unsuccessful applicant(s), then may go on sale Aug. 7, 2023.

NONRESIDENT EITHER-SEX/BUCK-ONLY PERMIT QUOTA

Nonresidents will be limited to 10,000 either-sex or buck-only permits; landowner and youth permits are excluded. No more than 3,000 Archery and 1,000 Muzzleloader permits will be sold to nonresidents.

STATEWIDE DEER

Statewide permits are valid statewide for the bag limit and season dates listed. Restrictions are noted.

2023 FORECAST

Elk populations have declined from recent highs, but numbers still are good across much of their range. They have expanded their range in recent years, as well. In response, management units have been restructured to help distribute permits and hunters appropriately. Units 1-7 align with areas of historic elk use and numbers; quality and permit success should remain similar to previous years. Units 8-14 include peripheral areas where elk use is less predictable; quality and success rates likely are to be lower. Unit 15, which has no permit quota, includes much of eastern Nebraska, where elk use is intermittent. Permits for Units 1-14 also are valid in Unit 15, to allow for hunter harvest of elk in eastern Nebraska.

SEASON DATES

- Bull Archery: Sept. 1 Oct. 31, 2023
- Firearm: Sept. 21 Oct. 31, 2023
- Antierless: Aug. 1, 2023 Jan. 31, 2024
- Early Antlerless: Aug. 1 Oct. 31, 2023
- Late Antierless: Nov. 1, 2023 Jan. 31, 2024
- Public land closed to Antlerless Elk permits from Aug. 1 Sept. 20, 2023

LEGAL DESCRIPTION OF AN ELK

- Bull A male with antlers 6 inches or more in length.
- Antlerless No antlers or antlers less than 6 inches in length.

PERMIT MAXIMUMS:

- Individuals may only have one elk permit per year and may only submit one application per year.
- General Cow: No more than one in five years.
- General Bull: No more than one in five years; bull harvest limit of once in a lifetime.
- Landowner Cow: One per year.
- Landowner Bull: No more than one in three years.

PERMIT DRAWING

- General Bull permits are drawn based on a bonus-point system. Unsuccessful applicants are given a
 point, which is applied to future drawings. Applicants have an additional chance in the drawing for
 each point that they accumulate. Bonus points only are awarded for first-choice bull permits.
- General Antlerless permits are drawn on a lottery system following the completion of the Bull permit drawing from the same application. Applicants have one chance in the antlerless drawing.
- Landowner Bull permits are drawn on a preference point-based system. Unsuccessful applicants are
 given a point that is applied to future drawings; nonresident landowners receive 0.9 points instead
 of 1. Applicants with the most points are given preference in the drawing.
- Landowner Antlerless permits are drawn on a lottery system following the completion of the Bull permit drawing from the same application. Applicants have one chance in the antlerless drawing.
- All points are lost when a bull permit is issued from the drawing.
- In lieu of participating in the draw, landowners may purchase one elk preference point per year during the application period, or general elk hunters may purchase one bonus point.
- Draw statistics from previous years can be found at <u>OutdoorNebraska.gov</u>.
- Any forfeited permits may be made available to the next unsuccessful applicant(s), then may go on sale Aug. 9, 2023.

ELK AND PRIVATE LAND

Most elk in Nebraska live on private land, and elk hunters should be prepared to gain access to private land to hunt elk. Landowner permission is always required to hunt on private land.

- Between May 15 and June 2, 2023, deliver completed application and payment for the permit price and application fee to the following Commission district office only, depending on unit. Applications received after 5 p.m. on June 2, 2023, will be rejected.
 - Northwest District 299 Husker Road, P.O. Box 725, Alliance, NE 69301. Units: 1, 2, 3, 4, 8, 9, 10 and 11.
 - Bassett Service Center 524 Panzer St., P.O. Box 508, Bassett, NE 68714. Units: 6, 7 and 14.
 - Southwest District 301 E. State Farm Road, North Platte, NE 69101. Unit: 5, 12 and 13.
- 4. District staff will validate your application and enter in drawing, if eligible.
- 5. Failure to provide complete and accurate information may lead to disqualification.

FREE-EARNED LANDOWNER ELK PERMIT

A person who owns or leases at least 80 acres of farm- or ranchland for agricultural purposes qualifies for an either-sex elk permit – known as a free-earned landowner elk permit – following the verification of 10 general antlerless elk harvests; immediate family members are eligible for the permit. The free-earned permit does not affect eligibility for general or landowner permits. Contact a district office for details.

Antelope

2023 FORECAST

Antelope populations have declined the past two years and there have been reductions in permit quotas for 2023. Antelope populations have declined across many parts of Nebraska due to drought and increased harvest in recent years. Research in western Nebraska showed hemorrhagic disease and drought in 2021 affected antelope survival and distribution. For 2023, permits were decreased in several units to account for decreased populations and harvest success in 2022. Nonresident opportunity is restricted to statewide archery permits, landowner permits and late doe/fawn, if available.

SEASON DATES:

- Archery: Aug. 20 Dec. 31, 2023
- Muzzleloader: Sept. 16 Oct. 1, 2023
- Firearm: Oct. 14 29, 2023
- Late Doe/Fawn: Nov. 1, 2023 Jan. 31, 2024

PERMIT MAXIMUM

Each person is allowed one antelope permit per year.

LEGAL DESCRIPTION OF ANTELOPE

- **Buck** Antelope with horns longer than its ears.
- **Doe/Fawn** Antelope with no horns or with horns shorter than its ears.

PERMIT DRAWING:

- Persons age 12 and older are eligible to apply for antelope permits.
- All either sex rifle and muzzleloader antelope permits are DRAW permits and available during the application period to residents, resident landowners and nonresident landowners.
- Archery Antelope is a DRAW permit for nonresidents.
- In lieu of participating in the draw, hunters may purchase one antelope preference point per year during the application period.
- Any forfeited permits may be made available to the next unsuccessful applicant(s), then may go on sale Aug. 8, 2023.
- The antelope drawing is a preference point-based system and those applicants that were unsuccessful are given a preference point toward future drawings, with the exception the nonresident landowners receive 0.9 preference points instead of 1.

NEBRASKA

GAME (1) PARKS

- Permits are awarded to applicants with the highest number of points first until permit quota is filled.
- All points are lost once a permit is awarded during the drawing, whether first or second choice.

2023 FORECAST

Bighorn sheep herds inhabit the Pine Ridge and Wildcat Hills of western Nebraska, with a current population of approximately 275. Past transplants have established bighorns in some of their historic range. Research monitors herd health, movement, distribution and future transplant locations. Lamb survival in the southern Panhandle remains good, with populations stable to increasing. Lamb survival in the Pine Ridge remains poor, and a significant loss of adults in the Barrel Butte herd resulted in a population reduction. Staff are monitoring populations and herd health.

SEASON DATES

Nov. 28 - Dec. 22, 2023

BIGHORN SHEEP HUNTING AREA

All of Banner, Box Butte, Dawes, Morrill, Scotts Bluff, Sheridan, and Sioux counties. The exact hunting location within Banner, Box Butte, Dawes, Morrill, Scotts Bluff, Sheridan and Sioux counties will be determined by the Commission, depending on ram availability. Where to Hunt

PRIVATE LANDS

It is the responsibility of every hunter to get permission to hunt, trail game or retrieve downed game on private land, whether the boundary is posted or not, including railroad right-of-ways. Hunting without permission may result in a fine of up to \$500, three months in jail and the loss of hunting privileges for up to three vears.

PUBLIC LANDS

The Public Access Atlas lists more than 300 publicly owned areas. Refer to the atlas for areaspecific regulations. Unless otherwise posted, big game hunting is allowed on all wildlife management areas. Hunting is allowed on most state recreation areas beginning the Tuesday following Labor Day, with hunting prohibited within 100 yards of any public use facility or activity area.

Some areas have specific restrictions:

- Nebraska state parks, wavside areas. hatcheries, reserves, and state refuges are closed to hunting unless otherwise posted.
- Use of ATVs and UTVs is not allowed on public lands unless specifically permitted by the managing agency.

PUBLIC ACCESS ATLAS

There are more than a million acres of publicly accessible lands throughout Nebraska, The Public Access Atlas identifies and consolidates these public access resources for the benefit of Nebraska's hunters, trappers and anglers. The printed atlas is available wherever hunting and fishing permits are sold. Scan the OR code to view the atlas. It also may be viewed at OutdoorNebraska.gov. Search "Public Access Atlas "





• Most national wildlife refuges managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and national forests and grasslands managed by the U.S. Forest Service are open to hunting, unless otherwise posted.

OPEN FIELDS AND WATERS PROGRAM

The Open Fields and Waters Program has opened more than 380,000 acres of private land to public walk-in hunting access across Nebraska. This voluntary program offers financial incentives to landowners willing to allow public walk-in access for hunting, trapping and/or fishing.

MOUNTAIN LIONS ON CAMERA

Regulations relating to season dates and weapon types apply, EXCEPT muzzleloaders are allowed only during the December muzzleloader and late firearm seasons. Muzzleloaders are not allowed during the November firearm season. Centerfire weapons are prohibited.

FORT ROBINSON STATE PARK

Access permit is required.

Seasons: Open to all open seasons except firearm antelope. Regulations relating to season dates, bag limits and weapon types apply. Antlerless mule deer harvest is prohibited.

How to Apply: Contact the Nebraska Game and Parks office at Fort Robinson SP at 308-665-2900 or stop in at the park office before you hunt.

ANTLERLESS ONLY DEER STATE PARK HUNTS

Access permit is required to hunt in designated areas.

Archery Seasons: Antlerless harvest only. Open to Archery, Youth, Wahoo AOSC permit holders with archery equipment. Park season dates: Platte River SP, Eugene T. Mahoney SP and Schramm Park State Recreation Area, Nov. 27-30, 2023; Dec. 4 - 7, 2023; Dec. 11 - 14, 2023; Dec. 18 - 21, 2023; Jan. 1 - 4, 2024 (Schramm only), archery tag not valid; Jan. 8 - 11, 2024 (Schramm only).

General Information

PERMIT CANCELLATION

• Following the harvest of any big game animal, hunters must immediately punch or notch the permit or tag to indicate sex and date of kill. The canceled permit or tag must be attached to the animal or remain with the hunter if the carcass remains in the hunter's possession until completion of the check in process.

CHECKING DEER, ANTELOPE AND ELK

- Registering your harvest of deer, antelope and elk is mandatory in Nebraska and must be completed before the carcass leaves the state.
- It is unlawful to separate a deer, antelope or elk carcass into sections smaller than quarters before completing the harvest check in process. Quartering is defined as four legs, with femur or scapula naturally attached, and loins.
- Deer harvested during the November firearm season must be delivered to a check in location no later than 1 p.m. on the day following the close of the season. A list of check stations may be found on the deer regulation sheets and at <u>OutdoorNebraska.gov</u>.
- Each permit holder must accompany the deer to the check station and check in their deer.
- Deer harvested outside the November firearm season and all antelope and elk must be checked via Telecheck within 48 hours of kill and before 1 p.m. on the day following the close of the season.
- Permit and check station seal number or check station verification number must be retained when transporting all or a portion of the carcass to a point of permanent storage or processing.
- Hunters must record the seal number on their permit.

TELECHECK

- Telecheck allows hunters to check deer, antelope or elk by phone or online, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. See <u>OutdoorNebraska.gov</u> and search "Telecheck" for more information.
- There are several ways to access and complete your harvest report:
 - From your permit profile at <u>goOutdoorsNE.com</u>. Once logged in, select "Game Check Reporting" in the left-hand column and submit the required information.
 - From the login page on <u>goOutdoorsne.com</u>, select "Report Your Harvest Big Game Check-In" in the list of white boxes below the login options.
 - Call 844-279-4564 to complete over the phone.
- All deer harvested outside the November firearm season and all antelope and elk must be checked via Telecheck.
- When completing Telecheck, the following information will be required from your permit or animal: species, permit code, permit number, date of kill, county of kill, management unit (see maps), weapon used, sex of animal, and age of animal (adult or fawn).
- You may be asked questions about biological information, such as inside spread (between main beams) in inches for deer, horn length (measure from the base around the outside curve to the horn tip) for antelope, and elk main beam length (measure from the base of the antler to the tip of the main beam).
- Write the seal number on the permit after completing Telecheck.

RECOVERING DEER

Tracking dogs may be used to recover deer. Landowner permission is required to track or recover deer on private land.

SHOOTING HOURS

It is legal to hunt big game 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes following sunset.
HUNTER ORANGE

Any people hunting antelope, elk, mountain (bighorn) sheep, or deer under the authority of a firearm permit during an authorized firearm season must display on his or her head, chest and back at least 400 square inches of hunter orange material. Hunter orange requirements also apply while hunting under the authority of a muzzleloader permit during muzzleloader seasons. Archery deer hunters must do the same while archery hunting during the November firearm deer season and during the late antlerless seasons. Firearm hunters during the Special Landowner Deer Season must wear hunter orange; archery hunters are exempt.

HUNTING NEAR DWELLINGS

200-Yard Rule: It is unlawful to hunt any form of wild mammal or wild bird with a rifle within a 200-yard radius of an inhabited dwelling or livestock feedlot, unless permission to do so has been granted by the owner or tenant of that dwelling or feedlot.

100-Yard Rule: It is unlawful to hunt any form of wild mammal or wild bird with archery equipment, handgun or shotgun within a 100-yard radius of an inhabited dwelling or livestock feedlot, unless permission to do so has been granted by the owner or tenant of that dwelling or feedlot.

LIQUIDATED DAMAGES

The following are penalties for illegally killing big game in Nebraska.

- Bighorn Sheep \$25,000
- Elk Bull, 12 points or more, \$10,000; other elk \$3,000
- White-tailed Deer 8 points or more with 16-inch spread \$10,000; other antlered bucks \$2,000; antlerless \$500
- Mule Deer 8 points or more with 22-inch spread \$10,000; other mule deer \$2,000
- Antelope Buck with 14-inch horn length \$5,000; other antelope \$1,500
- Mountain Lion \$5,000
- Bear or Moose \$1,500

UNLAWFUL ACTS

- Shooting from the Road It is illegal to shoot from a bridge or public road, including the travelled surface and right of way.
- Hunting Over Bait It is illegal to hunt any big game animals or turkeys within 200 yards of a baited area. An area is be considered baited for 10 days following the complete removal of all bait. The hunter and the animal must be outside of the baited area during the harvest or attempted harvest. A baited area is any location where grains, fruits, vegetables, nuts, hay, minerals (including salt), or any other natural food materials, commercial products containing food materials, or by-products of such materials that may attract big game or turkey. The use of scents alone, normal environmental conditions, standard farming and ranching practices, forest management, wildlife food plantings, orchard management, or similar land management activities do not constitute a baited area. It is unlawful to create a baited area on lands owned or controlled by the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission.
- **Carrying Firearms While Archery Hunting** It is illegal to possess a firearm while hunting under the authority of an archery permit, EXCEPT it is legal to carry a handgun with a barrel no longer than 5 inches while hunting under the authority of an archery or muzzleloader permit. Any take or attempted take of wildlife with the aid of the handgun, other than the immediate protection of human life, is prohibited.
- Guiding for Fee It is illegal to provide guide service for a fee on state wildlife management areas.
- Weapon Sights Red-dot and illuminated reticle sights and laser rangefinder scopes are permitted. It is unlawful to possess night-vision scopes while hunting game animals and game birds.
- Drones It is illegal to use drones to spot or locate game animals or birds during a hunting season.

NEBRASKA DRONE LAW

For all game birds and big game animals: It shall be unlawful for any person one day before or throughout any open season to spot, locate, or place under surveillance any game animal or game bird with the aid of any aircraft (to include drones) and convey information about such animal's or bird's location to any person or group of persons by radio or other electronic device (which includes photography taken from unmanned aircraft). The use of aircraft (which includes drones) any time to hunt, drive, molest, chase, or harass game birds or game animals is illegal.

TURKEY HUNTING

Turkey hunting is legal during the November firearm deer season. People hunting with a fall turkey permit are required to wear hunter orange when hunting during the November firearm deer season. Legal weapons include shotgun and archery only; rifles are not allowed. Electronic calls are illegal.

FIREARM RESTRICTION

During the November firearm deer season, only hunters with a valid unfilled firearm deer permit may hunt wildlife other than deer with centerfire rifles or centerfire handguns, provided they are hunting in the management unit for which their deer permit is valid.

NOTICE

Game or fish taken in Nebraska must not be held in cold storage or home freezer longer than specified in season regulations. All game or fish take within or outside the state and placed in cold storage must be tagged. Game or fish taken in other states and brought into Nebraska may legally be put in cold storage, if properly tagged and identified.

	Notes for All Big Game Permits	

- Semi-automatics may hold no more than six cartridges; fully automatic, full-metal jacket and incendiary bullets are prohibited.
- Slingbows and airbows are not legal for turkey or big game.
- Arrows and spears must have sharpened hunting head with a blade of at least 7/16-inch radius from the center of the
 arrow shaft. Arrows and spears containing poison or stupefying chemical or having an explosive tip are prohibited.
- Magnifying and variable-power scopes are allowed for hunting big game. Scopes capable of using electricity to
 amplify natural light and those that project a visible light beam to a target are prohibited.
- Breech-loading (powder or bullet) muzzleloaders are not legal during the muzzleloader season.

Big Game Diseases

CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE

Chronic wasting disease is a fatal, transmissible prion disease of deer and elk. It is not known to spread to humans. Species specific prion diseases are present in sheep (Scrapie), cattle (BSE/Mad Cow), mink (TME) and humans (Creutzfeldt-Jakob). CWD has been documented in wild deer populations of 29 states and has been detected in 54 Nebraska counties (See map below). Since 1997, the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission has tested more than 57,000 deer, with 1,238 positives. Since 2015, Game and Parks primarily has focused sampling on bucks 2 years or older, since they are the population segment most likely to have chronic wasting disease.

The 2022 testing results were:

How does CWD spread? — CWD is believed to be spread in deer herds by direct contact with infected animals or contaminated substances: saliva, urine, feces, blood, brain, spinal cord, or soil. There is no known method to eliminate chronic wasting disease from wild herds.

How can we reduce the spread and reduce human contact with chronic wasting disease prions? — Follow these steps:

• Educate yourself and others about it.

• Do not artificially congregate deer by using supplemental feeds or methods that concentrate deer. These sites can become hot spots contaminated with feces, urine and prions from infected deer. Infected sites are impossible to clean up, but fencing or burial can reduce access.

• Dispose of deer remains (bones and tissue) at a landfill. Place remains in a heavy plastic bag before disposal to prevent contamination of soil. DO NOT transport the carcass back to the field.

How can I get my deer tested? — Hunters who wish to have a deer tested can contact an accredited lab in Nebraska or surrounding states for details by visiting <u>aphis.usda.gov/animal_health/nahln/downloads/</u> <u>cwd_lab_list.pdf</u>.

MENINGEAL BRAIN WORM

Meningeal brain worm is a disease that primarily affects mule deer and, to a lesser extent, elk with fatal results. It is a parasitic nematode that uses white-tailed deer as a host, but does not cause death. MBW has been a contributing factor in the decline and westward recession of mule deer in parts of Nebraska. Mule deer with MBW typically are observed standing out in the open and moderately unaware of their surroundings.

EPIZOOTIC HEMORRHAGIC DISEASE SUMMARY

In 2021, EHD was more prevalent than in recent years affecting most of the state. The greatest losses were in the northeastern part of the state. In 2022, the prevalence of EHD had decreased and very few reports were made throughout the state. For more on EHD in Nebraska, visit <u>OutdoorNebraska.gov</u>.
